Prof. Dr. Alexander Sandkamp is Junior Professor of Economics at Kiel University and Researcher at the Kiel Institute for the World Economy.

After studying in Oxford, London, and Paris, he received his doctorate at LMU Munich, where he also worked at the ifo Institute. His research and consultancy projects – among others for the European Parliament and various national ministries – focus primarily on the effects of trade policy on international trade.
